Colorado Book Awards Online General Nonfiction, History, Pictorial Finalist Reading

GREENWOOD VILLAGE, CO (April 21, 2020) Finalists in the General Nonfiction, History, and Pictorial categories will read and answer questions at a Zoom and Facebook Live event hosted by Colorado Humanities & Center for the Book on Friday, May 8, 2020 at 7 p.m. Adrian Miller, a food writer, attorney, and 2018 Colorado Book Award finalist, will MC. **Diana Kouris** will read from her history book, **Nighthawk Rising: A Biography of Accused Cattle Rustler Queen Ann Bassett of Brown's Park**. An award-winning author of nonfiction articles and books, Diana grew up a Brown's Park cowgirl in the famed region where Colorado, Wyoming, and Utah converge. Decades of research and writing have rendered Kouris an authority on the spellbinding history of the area.

**Daniel C. Guiet** will read from his history book, *Scholars of Mayhem: My Father's Secret War in Nazi-Occupied France*. He is the son of Jean Claude Guiet, who began his clandestine career as an embedded agent in occupied France during WWII. A graduate of Manual High School, Guiet attended the University of Colorado and was the Associate Director of Rocky Mountain Planned Parenthood. He now splits his time between Durango, Colorado and Nevy-sur-Seille, Jura, France.

**Timothy K. Smith** is the co-author of **Scholars of Mayhem: My Father's Secret War** *in Nazi-Occupied France*. A recipient of the Gerald Loeb career achievement award for editors, he was senior features editor at *Fortune* magazine, and before that a reporter and editor for *The Wall Street Journal*. Educated at Brown University and the Sorbonne, he lives in Connecticut with his wife and three children.

Mark Obmascik will read from his history book, *The Storm on Our Shores: One Island, Two Soldiers, and the Forgotten Battle of World War II*. A Pulitzer Prizewinning journalist and bestselling author of *The Big Year* and *Halfway to Heaven*, Obmascik won the 2009 National Outdoor Book Award for outdoor literature, the 2003 National Press Club Award for environmental journalism, and was the lead writer for the *Denver Post* team that won the 2000 Pulitzer Prize.

**Christie Aschwanden** will read from her general nonfiction book, **Good to Go: What** the Athlete in All of Us Can Learn from the Strange Science of Recovery. A

National Magazine Award finalist and a *New York Times* bestseller, she is the co-host of Emerging Form, a podcast about creativity. She has written for dozens of publications, including *the Washington Post*, *NPR.org*, *Smithsonian* and *O*.

**Connie Shoemaker** will read from her general nonfiction book, **Taste the Sweetness** Later: Two Muslim Women in America. Connie's interest in Muslim women began while spending four years in Cairo, Egypt, with her husband and children, teaching English and writing for several news organizations. The co-founder and director emerita of Spring International Language Center, she is a board member of Immigrant Pathways Colorado.

**Michael Bennet** will read from his general nonfiction book **The Land of Flickering Lights**. A Senator from Colorado since 2009, Michael is recognized as a pragmatic and independent thinker, and has built a reputation for taking on Washington dysfunction to address our greatest challenges, including education, climate change, immigration, health care, and national security. When not in Washington he lives in Denver with his wife and three daughters.

**Patrick Loehr** will read from his pictorial book **Bird Parade**. A Denver based creative professional, Patrick pursues interests related to storytelling, visual art, and media production. He has published several books, including two children's books written and illustrated for HarperCollins Publishers. A Colorado native, he earned his MFA in Visual Art from Lesley College of Art and Design (Boston, MA).

**Teague von Bohlen** will read from his pictorial book *Flatland*. An associate professor of fiction at the University of Colorado Denver, he serves as Fiction Editor for *Copper Nickel* and advises the student newspaper *The Sentry*. He was nominated for a Pushcart in 2020, and his first novel, *The Pull of the Earth*, won the Colorado Book Award in 2007. The stories in *Flatland* are drawn from his life and family in central Illinois, where his corn-fed heart still beats.

**Britten Leigh Traughber** is the illustrator of **Flatland**. A graduate of Bennington College (BA Visual Arts) and Illinois State University (MFA Photography), she has taught at Millikin University, Illinois State University, and the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Her work is in a few great collections, many homes, and fine publications. She currently lives in rural Vermont.

**Jill Tietjen** will read from her pictorial book, **Hollywood: Her Story, An Illustrated History of Women and the Movies**. An author, speaker, and electrical engineer, Tietjen is the co-author of *Her Story: A Timeline of the Women Who Changed America*, which received the Daughters of the American Revolution History Award Medal. She has conducted research into historical women around the world for the past 30 years and speaks around the country about women's contributions to history.

**Barbara Bridges** is the co-author of *Hollywood: Her Story, An Illustrated History of Women and the Movies*. Barbara has spent much of her life as a businesswoman. In 2006, she founded Women+Film, a program in partnership with Denver Film, bringing audiences together with movies that ignite discussions around global issues facing women today.
