**Dan Manzanares** will introduce his anthology, *All the Lives We Ever Lived: A Lighthouse Writers Workshop Community Anthology* **Vol. 1** During his time at Lighthouse Writers Workshop, he won a Mayor's Award for Excellence in Arts and Culture in 2016. He currently works at the University of Denver's Prison Arts Initiative. Contributing author, Michael Sindler will read.

**Becky Jensen** will read from the Northern Colorado Writers anthology, *Rise: An Anthology of Change*. Her entry "Follow the Hula Girl" is one of the 38 works by authors and poets featured in the Northern Colorado Writers anthology.

**David Boop** will read from his anthology, *Straight Outta Deadwood*. An author, screenwriter and award-winning essayist, David worked as a DJ, film critic, journalist, and actor before his releasing his debut novel, the sci-fi/noir *She Murdered Me with Science*.
