


Poet Laureate Nominations

Nominations for the next Colorado Poet Laureate are now open. Chosen by the Governor, the Colorado Poet Laureate will serve a four-year term beginning in July 2023. The Poet Laureate position was created to promote an appreciation of poetry in Colorado, to honor outstanding Colorado poets, and to serve as an active advocate for poetry, literacy, and literature by participating in readings and other events at schools, libraries, literary festivals, and the State Capitol. Nominations must be submitted no later than February 1, 2023 to Colorado Humanities & Center for the Book via Submittable.



Hammering Out Human Rights: Eleanor Roosevelt at the United Nations

Travel to the past and hear Eleanor Roosevelt speak of the groundbreaking, grueling, tempestuous, and eventually triumphant development of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, a Magna Carta for humankind. Along the way, gain insights to what brought Mrs. Roosevelt to be at the United Nations in the first place and the fears that in 1950 stoked animosities between the Soviet Union and the United States. Presented by Susan Marie Frontzcak, the program includes glimpses behind Mrs. Roosevelt's life before emerging as one of the 20th century's most remarkable women. Julian Rubinstein created a film based off his book *The Holly*. winner of the 2022 Colorado Book Award in General Nonfiction. The story centers on a controversial shooting that took place at a peace rally that anti-gang activist, Terrance Roberts organized. Over the course of seven years, Rubinstein unpacks the intricate layers of Roberts, the community, media misinformation, and the contentious history of criminal injustices that fed gang violence in Denver.
